Charity Auction of Artworks by 19 Artists "Plastic Revives" Exhibition

Opening November 10 (Fri.), 2023





POLA MUSEUM ANNEX (Ginza, Chuo-ku, Tokyo) is proud to announce that it will hold an exhibition and charity auction, "Plastic Revives," from November 10 (Fri.) to December 3 (Sun.), 2023.

Thanks to all the warm and generous support we received for our past three charity auctions, we were able to raise more than a total of 52 million yen (52,059,115yen) for various organizations, according to the main purpose of each year's auction. For our upcoming fourth charity auction, we are launching a new initiative. We have commissioned artists to create works of art using plastic recycled from the containers of cosmetic products of POLA ORBIS Group brands. Given the growing importance of resource recycling over recent years, we felt inspired to organize this event as an attempt to combine our strengths in art and in research and development, with the aim of expanding knowledge and awareness about the use of recycled materials and helping to shape a more recycling-oriented society.

A total of 19 artists are creating original artworks and drawings on the theme of "revival." All the works will be exhibited at POLA Museum Annex and offered for sale online, through a silent auction* and lottery. Related merchandise will also be available for purchase.

For this project, the artists have worked together with a research team from POLA Chemical Industries to create works that take full advantage of the characteristics of the recycled materials. Their collaboration has produced materials with a rich variety of expressiveness (it is hard to believe that some of them are really plastic), and generated a wide range of ideas. Their work has also focused on the application of recycled plastics to address the shortage of wood as a canvas support material. Don't miss this opportunity to see how these artists have breathed new life into plastics to create compelling works of art: "Plastic Revives."

All proceeds from the auction, lottery, and related merchandise sales will be donated to the marine conservation activities by an environmental organization in Japan.

* A silent auction is an auction without direct competition, in which all bids are privately submitted during a set time period. The highest bid at the end of the period wins the auction.

◆ Project Background

The POLA ORBIS Group has formulated a plastic resource recycling policy aimed at promoting a more recycling-oriented society. At the same time, in our efforts to ensure careful use of limited resources, we are facing a variety of challenges in our value chains, most importantly in relation to plastic containers and packaging materials for cosmetic products. At POLA Chemical Industries, we decided to make environmental impact reduction an important part of our research efforts, so we have been working hard on plastic recycling research. The idea for this project was inspired by our desire to tackle emerging social challenges by combining the Group's research and technology strengths, which were cultivated over many years, with our expertise in culture, art, and design.*

All the works exhibited in this project are made using recycled materials consisting of plastic containers of POLA B.A series and White Shot series products. While the artists connected with the POLA MUSEUM ANNEX were in the process of creating their works, we received various requests from them about the use of recycled plastics. To respond to the requests, researchers at POLA Chemical Industries made use of the knowledge accumulated from their R&D work on packaging container technology, along with sophisticated 3D tools and other advanced technologies, to generate synergies between "art" and "research." All this effort has resulted in a whole new outlook about recycled plastics that could not have been achieved by the POLA Group alone. We will leverage the knowledge we have gained through this initiative for future R&D, so that we can continue to make progress toward the realization of a recycling-oriented society.

About Materials

The original artworks feature materials made from reused plastic containers of POLA premium brand B.A series cosmetic products. The resin is cut up into pellets and remolded into panels, beads, and other forms.

The picture frames of the exhibited drawings are made of plastic recycled from the containers of POLA White Shot series of skin brightening products.

Born in 1980 in Hiroshima, Japan. After studying Japanese painting at Musashino Art University, she relocated to Germany in 2006. In 2013, she graduated with a master' s degree from the Academy of Fine Arts Leipzig, and in 2015 she earned the academic degree of Meisterschüler from the same institution. After returning to Japan in 2022, she is currently based in Tokyo. Using thinly dissolved oil paints, as in the technique of Japanese-style painting, and employing deep colors created with tempera and acrylics, she creates vivid worlds that throng with life, in which transparency and density seem to coexist. In 2012, she exhibited at the VOCA Exhibition, earning an Honorable Mention Award, and she received the Ohara Museum of Art Award. Major solo exhibitions include "First Island - Last Mountain" (Ohara Museum of Art, 2016), "Polar Green" (Tomio Koyama Gallery, 2019), "1:1" (Pola Museum Annex, 2021) and "Yuka Kashihara" (Aquavella Galleries, Palm Beach, US, 2022).

She then ventured overseas to study in Berlin, staying on to live in the city for a period. She currently lives and works in Takasaki, Gunma Prefecture. The installations she creates consist mainly of cloth embroidered with silk thread applied in layers over photos and drawings. The act of embroidery represents the artists' attempt to create a state of "temporariness," as well as a process of reconstructing, as tangible presences, memories, times, and lost things connected with the family home in which the artist lived, and the people intimately associated with her. She is also known for her "Restoration Series" of works made from broken tableware and daily necessities.
